OUR STORY

At 6 years old, our founder Lavaniyah's daughter, Mahiyaa Bala was diagnosed with a rare form of Leukemia. Since then, Lavaniyah caring for her daughter as she received medical treatment in Malaysia and Singapore which led her to have close contact with the parents of children with cancer who have not been covered by insurance or financially supported.

Recognizing a need for financial support for families battling cancer and skyrocketing medical bills, in 2022, Lavaniyah founded CCAM a Malaysia-registered charity that provides financial support for the treatment of children with cancer and their caregivers.

Our Mission

CCAM works to alleviate human suffering, especially in financial crises, to protect young life and those suffering from childhood cancer in Malaysia.

CCAM to reduce the children's cancer mortality rate in Malaysia.



OUR POLICIES

The Children Cancer Association Malaysia as a non-profit organization that is exempt from federal taxation, ensures donors' donation is spent as efficiently and effectively as possible.



The fund is strictly for paying the medical bills directly to the hospital, and shall not be transferable to any other applicant or converted to cash.



All funds collected on behalf of the patient will be directly paid to the hospital and after the deduction of expenses for treatment or surgery, the fund shall be returned to the committee to be utilized as CCAM deem fit.



The association appointed auditors to assures accountability and transparency through its oversight of internal controls, compliance, ethics, and accounting processes and practices.



As registered with the Registry of Society Ministry, CCAM practices the highest standards of organizational integrity.

FACTS ABOUT CANCER

Cancer is one of the deadliest diseases in Malaysia and accounted for 6,268 deaths in 2016. It is not just fatal, but cancer is also costly.

- **Almost 60% of cancers in Malaysia are detected late due to the low rate of early health screening**
- **Medical treatment cost is snowballing at 12.7% every year**
- **6 in 100000 Malaysians CHILDREN will develop cancer by the age of 6 years.**
- **Close to half of the Malaysian cancer patients are financially broke a year after diagnosis**
- **A family member may need to quit his or her job to assume the role of a caregiver.**
- **High-cost medical treatments which can go up to hundreds of thousand Ringgit, hidden costs such as alternative treatment, caregiver, medicine and loss of income, can also have a substantial impact on the family's finances.**

IN THE NEWS

- ❖ Cancer Cases In Kids Below Six Rising By 250 Cases Yearly
- ❖ According to the National Cancer Registry Report, Malaysia reported a total of 4,408 cancer cases involving children aged six and below from 2007 to date.
- ❖ Malaysia's incidence rate for cancer in children aged six and below is at 6 per 100,000 population, with an estimated 200 to 250 new cancer cases reported each year.
- ❖ A total of 4,408 cancer cases involving children aged six and below had been reported from 2007 until now.
- ❖ By gender, male children dominated with an incidence of 2.5 per 100,000 population and female children with an incidence of 2 per 100,000 population. By ethnicity, Malays have the highest incidence rate, followed by ethnic Chinese and Indians.
- ❖ The five main types of cancer among children in this age group are leukaemia, brain and spinal cord tumours, lymphoma, bone cancer, and eye cancer.
- ❖ Assume 13.1% medical inflation in the next 10 years

Difference between Private vs Public Healthcare in Malaysia

During emergency, private healthcare is a more viable option.
